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DIVISIONAL REPORTS

JUNIOR A

John Grisdale, BC Hockey Junior A Divisional Director

The British Columbia Hockey League's (BCHL) 52nd season is now in its postseason with the semifinals currently taking place. The league opted for a unique format for the league semifinals with the three (3) division champions facing off in a round-robin format. One (1) team will be eliminated with the others advancing to the Fred Page Cup Finals.

Currently, over 100 BCHL players have secured NCAA Division I scholarships, the most of any Junior A league in Canada. There were also seven (7) players listed by NHL Central Scouting as potential draft picks in the 2014 NHL Entry Draft. In June of this year, a record-tying seven (7) BCHL players were selected by NHL clubs. The scholarship and NHL draft success is directly tied to the initiation and growth of the BCHL Showcase, which has welcomed about 200 college and professional scouts each of the last two (2) years.

At the 2013 World Junior A Challenge in Yarmouth, N.S., 10 BCHL players took part and came home with a bronze medal.

The organizing committee of the 2014 Royal Bank of Canada (RBC) Cup in Vernon continues to be busy in its preparations for the national championship to be hosted at Kal Tire Place. Sales of ticket packages for the entire event and single games have been encouraging with the success of the hometown Vernon Vipers as a key reason for that.

A major priority for the league is improving each club's pay-per-view broadcasts, both in video and audio quality. High-definition developments are being discussed with partner FASTHockey and, if implemented, will drastically upgrade the viewing experience for fans watching from home and make highlights from around the league more usable for mainstream media.

Another initiative this spring is the opportunity for athlete testing (conformance with NHL Central Scouting Player Test Program) and evaluation across the each of the 16 BCHL spring camps. Each year, more than 2,000 young athletes attend BCHL spring camps and this year there will be more emphasis on the league's 'Smart Hockey' slogan and educating players on the BCHL path. This will include information on opportunities made available in professional and college hockey as a result of playing in the BCHL and the scholastic and athletic requirements for players and families wanting to remain eligible for both.

League discipline continues to be handled by Executive Director Trevor Alto. Director of Administration Dario Disnar has created reports to track major penalties, fights, calls for blows to the head and game misconducts to assist in discipline reviews. Disnar's reports also assist Director of Officiating Derek Adams in tracking travel expenses and payment for all BCHL officials.

Presence online is growing for the BCHL. The league tops Junior A circuits on Twitter with well over 5,000 followers. The league is continuing with its popular weekly and monthly newsletters reporting on current stories in the BCHL and BC Hockey. Smart Hockey Magazine is into its sixth season with the most recent edition online. The January academic all-stars issue was published in hard copy.

JUNIOR B

Once again BC had 39 Junior B teams operating in three (3) leagues in British Columbia. The leagues are the Kootenay International Junior Hockey League (20 teams), the Pacific Junior Hockey League (10 teams) and the Vancouver Island Junior Hockey League (9 teams). The only change this season was the transfer of the Penticton team to 100 Mile House, where they enjoyed a most successful season.

This year the three (3) leagues implemented a Junior B Supplement based on the Junior A supplement. It was the first time all three (3) leagues used the same supplementary discipline policies and the same supplementary rules. Infractions were tracked and consistent suspensions were applied in an effort to reduce dangerous infractions, including fighting. The supplement was a tremendous success but with a few minor adjustments being required for next season. We were most appreciative of the assistance from the BC Hockey branch office which issued a weekly infraction sheet for each league to assist with tracking. An initiative such as the acceptance of the Junior B Supplement helps to make the game safer for all players and allows them to improve in the area of skill development.

This year's Cyclone Taylor Cup was held in Nelson, BC. It was a most impressive tournament with a number of games being played before a full house (over 1200). All games were extremely competitive. Beaver Valley Nite Hawks defeated the Aldergrove Grizzlies to win Gold and the Victoria Cougars shut out the host Nelson Leafs 3-0 to earn the Bronze medal.

This year we hosted the Keystone Cup in Abbotsford, BC. Due to unforeseen circumstances, we played the tournament in a rink with an Olympic size surface. All teams adjusted quickly. The BC representatives (Beaver Valley Nite Hawks) were victorious over host Abbotsford to give BC its third gold medal in a row and our fifth in six (6) years at the Keystone. Blackfalds Wranglers of Alberta won the Bronze medal in a hard fought 4-3 victory over Thunder Bay Northern Hawks.

BC is still very much in favour of a national Junior B tournament possibly modeled after the Junior A Royal Bank Cup.

Thank you very much to Barry Petrachenko, Sean Orr and the staff of B.C. Hockey for their assistance this past season. Thank you also to Bill Ohlhausen, Joe O'Shea, George Richards and Ray Stonehouse for working so hard to ensure the success of their Leagues.

SENIOR MALE HOCKEY

This past season was very busy with the Canadian Interior Hockey League (CIHL) changing presidents midway through the year. The season was quite successful with Williams Lake hosting and winning the 2014 Coy Cup, defeating Terrace in the final game. Overall, the tournament was a total success.

The British Columbia Intercollegiate Hockey League (BCIHL) had another successful season with Selkirk College winning the BCIHL championship. The BCIHL has been working on an inter-branch championship known as the Frozen Four with two (2) teams from British Columbia and two (2) teams from Alberta competing. Unfortunately, the lateness of getting it off the ground with Alberta caused a couple of problems, so they will work on it for the 2014-15 season.

The Powell River Regals were the only Senior AAA team registered in BC this past year and they played for the McKenzie Cup in Red Deer against the Bentley Generals. Bentley defeated Powell River and went on to play for the Allan Cup in Dundas, Ontario held April 14-19th.

It is hoped that next year the teams from BC competing in the North Peace Hockey League (NPHL) will be able to compete for the Coy Cup

SENIOR FEMALE HOCKEY

Ten competitive senior female teams took to the ice for the 2013-14 season. The South Coast Female Amateur Hockey League (SCFAHL) operated with eight (8) teams, playing a 26 game schedule. Two (2) new teams joined the league for 2013-14, the South Fraser TNT in North Delta and Meadow Ridge Moose in Pitt Meadows/Maple Ridge, while the BC Thunder suspended operations for one (1) season. The new teams were immediately successful, with the Moose finishing in first place and the TNT in third. Midway through the season, the Moose reclassified to Senior AA, the only team in the branch in that category.

In the north, the Dawson Creek Elite Stars and the North Peace Eagles of Fort St. John participated in the Senior A Peace Country Female Hockey League.

At the Senior A provincial tournament, the Kamloops Vibe defended their championship with a 3-1 win over the South Fraser TNT in the final. The Richmond Devils, Simon Fraser University and Dawson Creek also participated. Meadow Ridge, Kamloops and South Fraser advanced to the Western Shield in Red Deer, Alberta April 10-13. Meadow Ridge participated in the A pool as BC Hockey Senior AA champions. Kamloops played in the B pool as BC Hockey Senior A champions, while South Fraser was admitted as a wildcard after Saskatchewan was unable to send a team.

Kamloops won the gold medal, defeating the Assiniboine Community College Cougars of Brandon, Manitoba in the championship game. South Fraser knocked off the Alberta champion Grande Prairie Panthers in the bronze medal game to place third.

SCFAHL hosted its third World Girls Hockey Weekend with a jamboree weekend on October 4-6 in Surrey, inviting the Female Midget League to stage one (1) of their Super Weekends in the same arena. In total, there were seven (7) Senior AA/A games and 12 Midget AAA games played over three (3) days.

DISTRICT REPORTS

EAST KOOTENAY REPORT

I assumed the duties of the East Kootenay District Director in October, so I'd like to start by thanking Wallace Ross, East Kootenay District President & the members of the East Kootenay District & Minor Hockey Associations for their patience while I became more familiar with the district. Due to the travel distance between the eight (8) associations in the district, the online option for district meetings was very helpful. In November, I travelled to Cranbrook for their district meeting, then to Invermere for the initial meeting for Tier 4 Bantam Championships. I attended the other monthly district meetings online.

There were 41 East Kootenay teams from Atom to Midget (recreational & carded) participating in various leagues this season. There were also a few teams from Montana competing in the East Kootenay Leagues. The associations also had 24 Initiation/Novice teams. Some of the associations without teams at the Pee Wee, Bantam or Midget levels had several Novice/Initiation teams, so hopefully this will increase their numbers at the higher levels as these players get older. Since the Female AAA Midget team & MML Kootenay teams were based in the West Kootenay district, East Kootenay players on those teams had to travel to participate.

Three (3) associations represented the district at seven (7) championships this year. Although none of the teams brought home a championship banner, some placed well in the standings.

Windermere Valley Minor Hockey hosted the Tier 4 Bantam Championships which was won by Langley, with the Fair Play Award going to Fraser Lake. Thanks to John Gillen who supervised the championships, Chris Prosser, host committee chair, the committee members, officials & volunteers who worked to make this a successful tournament.

There were seven (7) officiating clinics held in the district with 116 officials certified from Level 1 to Level 5. Forty-three coaches were certified at the Coach/Hybrid level in three (3) clinics & sixteen certified at the Developmental 1 Clinic.

Once more, approvals of travel requests accounted for a large portion of the workload. I dealt with 105 requests for out of district tournament & exhibition games. There were also three (3) match penalties assessed to East Kootenay players.

Thank you to all the BC Hockey District Committee members, District & Minor Hockey Association executive members & volunteers for the time you put into the programs so the players have a successful & enjoyable experience.

WEST KOOTENAY REPORT

This past season, West Kootenay had a total of 49 teams from the seven (7) West Kootenay Associations and Spokane Washington competing in Atom Recreational & Pee Wee, Bantam & Midget Recreational & Carded Leagues in the West Kootenay. Three (3) Tier 2 teams & the carded Female Pee Wee & Bantam teams also played several exhibition games in OMAHA. It was great to see the return of a Female Carded Pee Wee team after not having one last season. As in previous seasons, female players from all West Kootenay associations were eligible to attend tryouts for the female carded teams. Nelson was the host association for the Kootenay AAA Female Midget team & the MML



Kootenay Ice was also based here. There were 25 Initiation/Novice teams registered in the district which is an increase from last season.

Three (3) associations represented the district at eight (8) BC Hockey Championship tournaments. Although none of the teams brought home a championship banner, two (2) teams received the Fair Play Awards at their respective championships.

Nelson Minor Hockey hosted the Tier 3 Pee Wee Championships, which was won by Victoria, with the Fair Play Award going to Quesnel. It was a great week of hockey, with several exciting games. Thanks to Vince Vulcano and Cam Paterson, host committee co-chairs, their committee members, volunteers, officials, arena staff and all participating teams who made the tournament a success. I'd also like to thank the Whitehorse and Nelson players and coaching staff for their co-operation when the power went out during their round robin game. I really appreciated how well everyone in the arena, players, team officials, game officials and fans handled the situation and co-operated with the arena staff when we had to leave the arena.

Certification of officials was fairly consistent with last season with 168 officials from Level 1 to Level 5 certified at six (6) clinics this season. Coaching certification was up this year with 77 coaches certified at the Coach Hybrid Level and 15 certified at Developmental 1.

Over the season, I dealt with three (3) match penalties, which was a decrease of over 50% from last year. There were also 178 requests for out of district tournaments & exhibition games.

Thank you to all the BC Hockey District Committee Members, District & Minor Hockey Association executive members & volunteers for the time you put into the programs so the players have a successful & enjoyable experience. Finally, I'd like to thank Teri Craft, Past District President of WKMHA for all her work over the last few years & wish her the best of luck as she moves to the Okanagan.

LOWER MAINLAND REPORT

Dave Buck, Len Cuthbert, and Bonnie Cameron, BC Hockey District Directors

For the 2013-2014 hockey season, 1251 minor hockey teams participated in regular PCAHA league programs, while a further 5 (five) Hockey Canada Sport School (HCSS) teams participated in their evolving programs. The 3 (three) district directors divided up responsibility for these programs as follows: Bonnie Cameron dealt with the Midget and Juvenile levels (which includes the Sport School teams), Bill Veenstra dealt with the Bantam level, and Dave Buck dealt with Female hockey and all programs Pee Wee and below. Dave Buck also handled all tournament permission requests.

Registration Levels

A table showing the number of teams participating within the Lower Mainland district is located in this report. Overall, the number of teams decreased from 1304 in 2012-2013 to 1256 in 2013-2014 (by comparison, in 2011-2012 there were 1288 teams). Player registration decreased from 20,088 in 2012-2013 to 19,526 in 2013-2014 – a decrease of 2.8%. The age groups showing the greatest decreases were Atom which decreased by 8 (eight) teams and 184 players (5%), Novice (H3/H4) which decreased by 14 teams and 158 players (4.95%), and Juvenile which decreased by 9 (nine) teams and 151 players (22%) (mostly attributable to the loss of the Juvenile C league). Registration at the Tyke level was also down by 92 players (4.1%). Pee Wee Female was down by eight (8) teams this year; however, there were increases in the numbers of integrated Pee Wee teams, and this may reflect a choice by some of the stronger Pee Wee female players to play in integrated leagues which are now non-bodychecking. Registration in Bantam A, which jumped last year when bodychecking was

eliminated from “C” hockey, has continued at the higher level. There was a decrease in Midget “A” registration – however, much of that is probably attributable to the formation of five (5) Hockey Canada Sport School teams at the Midget level. The decline at the younger age levels most likely reflects parents choosing to register their children in other sports. This year there was not a strong external public focus on the sport (no local winter Olympics, no long Canucks playoff run), while at the same time there was extensive media focus on the dangers of the sport, especially concussions. As well, the usual barriers to entry (rising costs for registration and equipment, lack of facilities, long waiting lists) continue to impede growth in registration.

PCAHA Meetings

We attended 10 PCAHA monthly Executive meetings. We also attended the PCAHA Semi-Annual General meeting in September, as well as Presidents’ Caucus meetings in October, January and April, and will attend the AGM in May. We worked directly throughout the year with PCAHA Managing Directors and other executive members as issues arose during the season.

Coach / Manager Meetings

PCAHA holds a series of coach/manager meetings in late September and early October every year. One of the district directors attended each of the 14 meetings in order to explain some of BC Hockey’s programs and to answer any questions. In addition to these meetings, one of us attended a briefing session held by PCAHA for new MHA presidents in June 2013.

District Leadership Meeting

Our District Leadership meeting was held on October 24th, 2013. Everyone gave a short explanation of what they hoped to accomplish in their area this year. Questions and concerns were discussed.

Coach Clinics

A total of 29 coaching clinics were held in the Lower Mainland district, hosted by 19 different MHAs. Some 610 coaches participated in the 18 Coach Hybrid clinics, while 282 coaches participated in the 11 Developmental 1 clinics.

Referee Clinics

Within the Lower Mainland there were six (6) “super clinics” for returning officials. In addition, some 30 smaller clinics were held by MHAs for new officials. Overall, some 1272 Level 1, 505 Level 2, and 34 Level 3 officials were certified through Lower Mainland clinics – an increase of about 150 from last year. Overall (with some officials having carded elsewhere) we have approximately 2,150 certified officials working in minor hockey in the Lower Mainland. The Lower Mainland RCMs also attend the PCAHA Executive, President’s Caucus and Semi-Annual meetings. As well, PCAHA has a Referee Development Committee and the RCMs liaise with that committee as well as with the Referees in Chief from the various MHAs to ensure ongoing referee development and monitoring within the limits of the resources available to them. We would like to thank our RCMs Ed Adams, Ryan Bulger and Al White for their continued support and assistance. Special recognition is due to Ed Adams who is stepping down at the end of this season after many years of service to BC Hockey (as well as PCAHA and local MHAs).

Organizing for Championships

The Lower Mainland hosted 6 (six) BC Hockey Championships in March 2014 – Juvenile hosted by Richmond MHA, Midget Tier 1 hosted by North Vancouver MHA, Bantam Tier 2 hosted by Mission MHA, Pee Wee Tier 1 hosted by Vancouver Thunderbird MHA, Pee Wee Tier 4 hosted by Seafair MHA, and Female Pee Wee hosted by Surrey FHA. All were great successes, and we give our thanks to the host committees for their hard work. In order to prepare, we held 3 (three) meetings of organizing committee representatives – one each in October, December and January. Special thanks

to former BC Hockey executive committee members Lochie Bell and Richard Alder, and PCAHA President Cindy Secord, who stepped up to help supervise championships.

Compared to last year, the number of Gross Misconducts is down (from 127 to 76). However, the number of match penalties is up slightly (from 167 to 176). We continue to struggle with obtaining timely reporting from officials of serious penalties – as (we are advised) do the PCAHA officials who deal with Game Misconducts. We understand that there has been discussion of moving to an online reporting system for officials. We are now well into the second decade of the 21st Century and current-day expectations as to timely communications strongly militate in favour of an approach that harnesses modern day technology.

Tournaments and Out-of-Province Exhibition Game Sanctioning

For this season, the district directors have delegated sanctioning of tournaments and exhibition games that are out-of-district but within British Columbia to the PCAHA managing directors. Dave Buck continues to process approval requests for out-of-province sanction approvals. Over the course of the season, some 270 applications were submitted – 234 for tournaments and 36 for exhibition games. The applications can be broken out as follows:

Hockey Canada Sport Schools

There are 5 (five) Hockey Canada Sport Schools this year in the Lower Mainland – 2 (two) at Yale Academy (Abbotsford), 2 (two) at Burnaby Winter Club, and 1 (one) at South Delta. These sport schools have had an impact on some of the traditional Midget A teams, as a number of players who might otherwise have played in Midget A programs have chosen to participate in the sport school programs. At the same time, the feedback from those players who are participating in the programs has been generally very positive. This is forcing MHAs to reconsider their programs and focus on ways to attract and retain participation from their players. It may have a similar impact on the Major Midget program. At least one of the existing sport schools has announced plans to start a Bantam program for the 2014-2015 season, and the impact of that expansion will be of interest to all MHAs.

The host committee, led by Sheila McLaughlin, did a sensational job and once again, we received positive feedback. The southern teams that travelled to the North East enjoyed themselves thoroughly and the games were well attended by the local community. Surrey came out as champions with the South Island winning the Fair Play Award.

On the district level, I would like to thank Referee Committee Member (RCM) Kevin Lindsey who was able to put a referee clinic on in every association this year. I would also like to thank Shawn Brinsky who picked up the District Coaching Coordinator (DCC) responsibility after our DCC had to relocate unexpectedly at the start of the year.

eLearning Update

This season BC Hockey introduced a new online component to the Coach Hybrid program. The Hockey University portion of this was very well implemented and received by our membership. BC Hockey will be sending Jim Weicker, Branch Coach Coordinator to an eLearning – Year in Review seminar hosted by Hockey Canada in late April.

Checking Certification

BC Hockey program leaders created both checking curriculum and an implementation plan to incorporate checking skills into every Coach Hybrid seminar. We received great feedback on this initiative and are now looking at options with our Developmental 1 program.

High Performance 1 Seminar

BC Hockey held a very successful High Performance 1 seminar in Penticton this past summer. The event was highlighted by a keynote presentation by Barry Trotz, one of the longest tenured coaches in NHL history.

This summer BC Hockey has teamed up with the Coaches Site Seminar to deliver the High Performance 1 Seminar. This seminar will be expanded to include up to 60 delegates and will operate out of the University of British Columbia, Vancouver Campus. HIGH PERFORMANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

MALE HIGH PERFORMANCE

The Male High Performance Program continues to deliver a program the entire branch can be proud of. The synergy within the group of District Evaluators (DE) and the volunteers who make the program possible is an incredible example of giving back to the game. I cannot thank the volunteers (High Performance Committee members, DEs, evaluators, coaching staffs, trainers, mentors and officials) enough for making our program the envy of the country.

Since last year's Annual General Meeting (AGM) the program completed a very successful Provincial Camp in Nanaimo. There we took the top 44 players before final cuts to determine the team going to the WHL Western Branch Cup last October in Calgary. The team brought home silver from the championship defeating Saskatchewan and Manitoba but were unable to crack Alberta. The team's staff set new standards in technology use on the bench for all the western branches. Bench staff was able to immediately show players clips on iPads at the end of the player's shift. Although we strive for gold, competing to the best of our combined abilities was obvious.

I believe the concept of the regional camps has been effective in trying to attract elite hockey players at the U16 level. The U16 regionals evaluate nearly 700 players over two weekends; this is an enormous task that is handled primarily on the backs of very dedicated volunteers. We need to continue to try and recognize the tremendous amount of time, skill and integrity these people give to the program on top of the local MHA teams they are already involved with.

With the completion of April's U16 Cup in Salmon Arm, 44 players were identified to take the next step to provincial camp in Nanaimo this summer. The provincial camp will round off the formal sessions and serve as a tool to identify the players that will make Team BC, which will compete in the 2015 Canada Winter Games (CWG) in Prince George. The final Team BC roster will likely be released in late November or December depending on CWG deadlines. As defending Canada Winter Games Champions, Team BC will be staffed by a proven team including; Jim Dinwoodie, Eric Blais, Ryan Weber and Director of Operations Mitch Pinsky. We look toward keeping the gold in BC next February.

Moving forward, BC Hockey should be rolling out the new U15 Program in the spring of 2015. This will be an open camp for first year Bantams from around the branch and hosted regionally. This U15 program will be an introduction to the High Performance program and will more effectively prepare the players for their High Performance endeavours. The recommendation from the High Performance program for the 2015 U16 program will be to narrow the number of players identified to participate in the BC Cup from 160 to 120.

I have every confidence the program will continue to deliver quality experiences for the players and staffs. Again, on behalf of BC Hockey, my thanks to the huge cast of volunteers from around the branch for their contributions to the program.

FEMALE HIGH PERFORMANCE

The Female High Performance program continues to offer quality programs to players at the U14, 16 and 18 levels. With the three (3) programs combined, we attracted nearly 700 female hockey players. The players are certainly committed to participating with the program. There is no doubt that the program requires recruitment and support from across the branch; all districts and all MHAs, to help bolster the volunteer pool of coaching staffs and district personnel. Although the U14 is the least attended, we are planting the elite seed with them.

Coach certification in High Performance 1 (HP1) is going to be a critical element to address as we continue in the future. Our pool of HP1 qualified coaches is minimal and therefore we keep coming back to a very limited group of incredibly selfless volunteers. We have been fortunate in recently attracting a few new coaches and trainers at both the U16 and 18 levels but this push to identify and attract more personnel is critical.

The U16 teams from all the BC Winter Games (BCWG) regions participated in the games in Mission last February. It was an exciting event for the athletes and coaching staffs but it is not an “elite” athlete or “high performance” event. Due to the inability of the branch to be able to control issues like accommodations, travel and meals, BC Hockey will not be applying to be a core sport in female hockey at the 2016 event. It is the resolve of the Female HP Committee that we can give the players the development opportunities they require at this level in a much more effective way by holding our own U16 event as we have in the off years. I am confident in this move as the boys withdrew some years ago for the same reasons.

Last November, BC Hockey sent arguably, the most talented U18 Team to the National Championships. Team BC was a favorite for the medals heading in but we could not find the back of the net and our finish was disappointing. We are moving forward, with a powerhouse coaching staff of seasoned, female hockey veterans. The coaching staff selected to Team BC all has experience at the national and international level. Nancy Wilson will be the Director of Operations and I have confidence that no one in the branch is more qualified to fill this role. We were fortunate to land another “apprentice” coach for the Canada Winter Games so we will be taking an extra coach to continue their pathway in to our U18 program.

The U18 Cup that took place in Salmon Arm on April 23-27 and was a well-attended, successful event. Eighty players were identified to play on four teams in a jamboree format. We drew scouts from universities, colleges and sports schools in Western Canada. The facility in Salmon Arm provides an excellent environment for the players and coaching staffs to excel. The 44 players moving to May Camp in Lake Cowichan were identified after thorough discussion and evaluation. After the May Camp, the team will be identifying a short list for the run up to the Canada Winter Games next February in Prince George.

I cannot salute the volunteers enough for their dedication and integrity in offering such high quality experiences for our female hockey players. Please members, help us find more quality volunteers for these eager players.

CLINICS

BC Hockey introduced a new online eLearning component in 2013-2014. This Hockey Canada initiative required all level one (1) and brand new level two (2) officials participate in the online modules. 2632 Officials registered for the eLearning component of certification. As of the end of the 2013-2014 season The four (4) hour face to face certification clinic continued to be used for all officials. The BC Hockey Officiating program also utilizes WebEx as a vehicle to certify and meet with Hockey Canada Officiating Program (HCOP) instructors reducing the need for in person meetings throughout the province. The number of clinics held this season increased by one (1) overall.

CRIMINAL RECORD CHECKS

All officials 18 years and older are required to complete a Criminal Record Check (CRC) and a Vulnerable Person Check (VPC) by December 31st of the current season. Those who do not complete them are ineligible to officiate within the confines of BC Hockey. To date, 76% of registered officials have completed the CRCs and VPCs. With the possible integration of an online CRC/VPC system being introduced this coming season, we expect to see a drastic impact on the necessary monitoring of outstanding requirements.

DEVELOPMENT

Since the majority of development of officials is done by the Minor Hockey Association's Referees In Chief, the Referee Committee Members were tasked with assisting/mentoring MHA Referees in Chief with development ideas including on-ice instruction, how to coach, discipline, evaluate and supervise officials. Several Referee Committee Members held open instructional sessions within their districts to help with this initiative.

BC Hockey's WHL Officiating Nights were held in four (4) locations from January 21-31, 2014. A total of 60 level I and II officials from Vancouver, Prince George, Kamloops and Kelowna participated in these events. The event included admission to the game, and a 20-30 minute question and answer session with the WHL officials before the game.

BC Hockey's NHL Officiating Night was held March 23rd, 2014 at Rogers Arena. Ten minor BC Hockey officials were selected to participate via a social media essay writing contest. There were over 75 entries from around the province. Each winner was provided with two (2) tickets to the Vancouver Canucks vs. Buffalo Sabres game and they were given the opportunity to meet the NHL officials prior to the game. BC Hockey Alumni official Kiel Murchison was one of the NHL officials scheduled to work the game.

A pilot project was introduced this season in the MML regarding game incident reporting. The HCR game incident reporting system was used for all reportable incidents within the MML on a trial basis to assess the usefulness of this procedure. Currently the standard practice is to have game officials write

hand written reports and deliver them by mail to the appropriate recipients. This project was instituted to reduce administration time, create consistency in reporting and expedite the official's report process. A full assessment of this project is being reviewed.

FEMALE OFFICIATING DEVELOPMENT

The BC Hockey Female Officiating Program conducted the 2nd annual Female Development Camp in Kamloops November 21-24th, 2013. 29 Female Officials participated in the event and Hockey Canada Official Heather Richardson (Vancouver 2010 Olympic Linesman) participated as special guest speaker.

The BC Hockey Female Officiating Program also conducted an Officiating Showcase for some of the province's elite female officials at UBC March 7-9, 2014.
